This year Advent begins on Sunday, 1st December. The preacher at the 11:00AM Choral Eucharist will be the Rev'd Dr Keith Suckling. Our Advent Carol service will take place at 5:00PM on the same day, with the usual feast of Advent readings and music. This is one of the most evocative and beautiful services of the year and I would encourage you to come along. If you haven't attended our Advent Carol service before, then you are in for a treat. The Christmas service of Nine Lessons and Carols will be held on Sunday, 22nd December at 5:00PM and the Epiphany Carol Service will take place on Sunday, 5th January 2025 at 5:00PM. All three of these Carol services are wonderful occasions, each with their own unique music, emphasis and atmosphere. Please do put them in your diary and come along. All the other Advent Christmas services are listed in this month's magazine. I look forward to welcoming as many as possible to them and hopefully seeing old friends who are here for Christmas, as well as some new faces. Everyone will be very welcome at any or all of our services as we prepare for Christmas and welcome the birth of Christ.

I have already arranged quite a number of home Holy Communions for the sick and house bound. If you cannot get to St George's or if you know of someone who would like Holy Communion at home or anywhere else, then please contact me on 07902792080. I am very happy to bring the sacrament to anyone who cannot get to St George's over the next 4 weeks, or indeed at any time.

We will begin confirmation preparation for both adults and young people of secondary school age in January. Confirmation will be administered by our Bishop on Easter Eve, Saturday 19th April 2025 at 7:30PM. Anyone who is considering confirmation should speak to me before Christmas so we can arrange the classes. Parents of young people who want to know more about confirmation should also have a word with me. The classes are relaxed and will be age appropriate whether it is a class for young people or for adults.

May I take this opportunity to wish you all a blessed Advent and a happy, holy and peaceful Christmas this year.

The organ is in disrepair, this is not news, but it is becoming increasingly unreliable in certain divisions and the tender for renovations is now ready to be sent to prospective organ builders.

# SANTA CLAUS AND THE DALEKS

It takes only the jingle of a sleigh bell to take me back to a particular Christmas and a very particular place. Robb's amazing department store in Belfast's city centre.

My brother and I, aged six and ten respectively, boarded Santa's magic sleigh in those last days of 1963. Magic? Yes. It didn't actually move. But it certainly felt like it did to us as images of colourful fairy tales with Cinderella, Snow White, the seven dwarves and several toothless witches flashed past on the moving walls. Even Bambi put in a fleeting appearance, his white spots brilliant against the green and brown backdrop as we were carried through a fast-moving fairyland.

Two weeks from my eleventh birthday, still in short trousers and knee socks, I was entranced.

The old joke back in the 1960s was that the job of in-store Santa was about the cushiest you could get. Only four or five weeks' work a year, pretty comfortable hours from Monday to Saturday and a nice warm grotto to greet the children. A customer of my Dad's, an elderly gent of large proportions, who didn't need to be padded up for the part, took the job for one year and after 'suffering', his word, the little children to come to him, told Dad that 'Santa was 'underpaid and overrated, but that it was all right apart from the kids'.

One of the highlights of our family Christmas each year was our trip to see Santa at 'Robb's', officially John Robb & Co, a department store that had extended many times in the late 19th century. Originally it was at No 15 in 1861, expanding to No 11 by 1870 and through to No 1 and, by 1890, it covered an entire block. John Robb, 'wholesale and retail silk mercers, woollen-drapers etc' had arrived.

In truth, the store sold just about everything you could imagine from curtains to clothing, perfume to gardens tools. An offline emporium that was as grand as its magnificent façade and its glorious interior.

Robb's had a big reputation. It was arguably the most glamourous store in the city for around 100 years. Its window displays and festive tableaux were the envy of the other big retailers and it was certainly a family favourite with my mother and father. It was also, for a sizeable majority of the Belfast populace, the first port-of-call for all things connected to the North Pole. The latest toys, presents and, of course, Santa himself.

The big man always had the whitest beard, the loudest red suit and the longest queue of youngsters waiting impatiently for the chance to be photographed on his knee clutching a little present. Until that fateful Christmas when the Daleks came.

These metal monsters had appeared on our television screens the year before and captured the imagination of children and adults alike.

Following the early broadcast, the British press took the aliens to its heart, describing the show as 'splendid children's stuff, brilliantly directed, full of inventive touches and wonderful set-pieces'. We kids raved about it at school and my father used to imitate them with a rolled up newspaper at his forehead and a cry of 'Ex-ter-min-ate' when he came home from the early shift at work.

Just a year after the Daleks had appeared on our screens and around 10 million viewers tuned in each Saturday – the evil robots on wheels – standing only four-foot eight-inches, painted in silver with grey trimmings and operated by small actors cramped inside - had their sights set on seizing Christmas itself. Ironically, the eye-catching lights on their domes were actually Christmas tree lights covered by ping pong balls. Suddenly, it was all over the local news. The Daleks had landed in Belfast, had taken over a shop in Ann Street and had replaced Santa Claus. Doctor Who was nowhere to be seen.

We missed Robb's that year, my last visit to Santa until I returned much later as an adult, and we missed Father Christmas.

The Daleks were cold, sterile, despite their Christmas hats, and didn't have the necessary knees to welcome kiddies on board. Their voices, played through a tinny tannoy, were more frightening than festive. Their novelty visit – the word invasion was used widely on Tv and in the papers - had grabbed the headlines and captured the crowds, but our hearts were with the big man with the beard.

The following year, my brother Jimmy was back at Santa, Santa was back in favour and back at Robb's. The Daleks has been ex-ter-minated. Normal jingle services had been restored.

### In Memoriam Robbie FitzGibbon (1996-2024)



It is with great sadness that I announce the tragic death of my dear nephew, Robin (Robbie) FitzGibbon a very promising athlete and potential Gold Olympian. In 2019, he severely injured his ankle whilst training which required an operation and which drastically affected his running scores in order to qualify for the Olympics and Commonwealth games.

In 2022 he was diagnosed with a psychosis which caused him severe mental illness, he was receiving both therapy sessions and medication for this condition, however despite this, he died after falling from the Mill Hill road bridge above the A 27 near Shoreham by Sea, West Sussex on 7 October, aged 28. Robbie was an active member of Brighton Phoenix athletic club and was training for the Brighton Marathon in 2025, in order to raise funds for the mental health charity Mind for which he set up a just giving page. His father Robin, will now be running in the Marathon in 2025. If you would like to support Robbie's fund raising campaign for Mind, please visit his webpage.

# Journey of the Magi - TS Eliot

'A cold coming we had of it, Just the worst time of the year For a journey, and such a long journey: The ways deep and the weather sharp, The very dead of winter.' And the camels galled, sore-footed, refractory, Lying down in the melting snow. There were times we regretted The summer palaces on slopes, the terraces, And the silken girls bringing sherbet. Then the camel men cursing and grumbling And running away, and wanting their liquor and women, And the night-fires going out, and the lack of shelters, And the cities hostile and the towns unfriendly And the villages dirty and charging high prices: A hard time we had of it. At the end we preferred to travel all night, Sleeping in snatches, With the voices singing in our ears, saying That this was all folly.

Then at dawn we came down to a temperate valley, Wet, below the snow line, smelling of vegetation; With a running stream and a water-mill beating the darkness, And three trees on the low sky, And an old white horse galloped away in the meadow. Then we came to a tavern with vine-leaves over the lintel, Six hands at an open door dicing for pieces of silver, And feet kicking the empty wine-skins, But there was no information, and so we continued And arrived at evening, not a moment too soon Finding the place; it was (you may say) satisfactory.

All this was a long time ago, I remember, And I would do it again, but set down This set down This: were we led all that way for Birth or Death? There was a Birth, certainly, We had evidence and no doubt. I had seen birth and death, But had thought they were different; this Birth was Hard and bitter agony for us, like Death, our death. We returned to our places, these Kingdoms, But no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation, With an alien people clutching their gods. I should be glad of another death.
